Expert sessions introduced the principles of forensic psychiatry, ethical & legal issues, medico legal cases, assessment & treatment of various forensic cases & role of forensic mental health Nurse. The workshop focused on the cased based discussions on the cases related to aggression, sexual offence and substance misuse.

**Standard 8: Risk**

- ▶ The FSP may be at risk to self or others based on a number of static and dynamic risk and protective factors.
- ▶ The FMHN engages with mental health and criminal justice processes to manage risk at individual, interpersonal, organizational, and community levels
- ▶ **Standard 9: Transition**
- ▶ Transition between environments such as between higher and lower security environments or returning to the community are potentially stressful events for the FSP.
- ▶ This stress can result in decompensation of mental state, which may lead to behaviors such as deliberate self-harm, harm to others, or absconding, which can compromise the transition.
- ▶ Care and treatment planning for FSPs incorporates judgment about risks, protective factors, available resources, and therapeutic objectives
